WASHINGTON, D.C. The Maureen and Mike Mansfield Foundation today announced that Samuel Dundon has joined the Foundation's Washington, D.C., office as a program assistant. Mr. Dundon is responsible for the overall operation of the Foundation's Washington, D.C., office as well as management of the Foundation's website. His other responsibilities include supporting the Foundation's Board of Directors and related programs, and assisting with the Foundation's internship program.

Prior to joining the Foundation, Mr. Dundon worked in the governmental affairs department of Aflac International's Tokyo office. Sara Seavey has been with the Foundation since 2007, when her primary responsibility was to assist with the day-to-day implementation of the Mansfield Fellowship Program and the recruitment and selection of new Mansfield Fellows. Her responsibilities have since expanded to include support for the development and implementation of the U.S.-Japan Network for the Future program, the U.S.-Japan Healthcare and Medical Device Exchange, Northeast Asia 2025, and other programs. Ms. Seavey holds a BA in international relations from Connecticut College.
